Awarding the Best of the Firsts

KWA:

I surprised myself by choosing the winner from the young writer section. As always in this sort of judging, setting the standards was the hard part. How to compare a juvenile poem with a novel excerpt and the novel excerpt with a sonnet?

I came up with these criteria:

- 1) Internal integrity: The piece followed its own rules, lived within its own boundaries from beginning to end.
- 2) Vividness: My emotions were engaged; I could see and feel and perhaps hear and smell and touch.
- 3) Originality: It did something just a little differently.
- 4) Interest: I felt that I had gained something by reading it.

Your Young Writer's Prose winner met all of those criteria in my view, and met them a little better than the others did.

- 1) There is so much she could have said and didn't about the foster family experience. There is not a single ounce of fat in this essay—and yet from a simple question it fills up a great deal of emotional space.
- 2) The lists were heart-rending, but while they did engage my emotions, they did not pander to my fascination for the gruesome or pathetic.
- 3) The narrative voice begins by inviting the reader to listen in a friendly sort of way, but by the end the relationship is more contentious; the reader is placed in the position of one of those who ask questions. I liked that.
- 4) I learned from this piece and enjoyed learning.

If there is a runner up, it would be in my estimation the Adult Beginnings of a Novel entry (Ed note: Gordon Kessler's *The Storegga Effect*). This entry is a wild ride and strains my credulity more than once, but it also excites my imagination, makes me want to read on, to find out what happens next. My own limitations make it impossible for me to know how original it is, but it certainly is vivid and carries what promises to be a fairly complex plot forward without distraction.

2004 Competition

The 2004 competition is over. Awards have been handed out and the anthology is in the works. It was a tremendous contest with twice as many entries this year as ever before.

They came from not only the State of Kansas but from across the nation. KWA received entries from Missouri, Arkansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, South Carolina, Illinois, Oregon, Montana, North Carolina and California. Within Kansas, entries flowed in from Prairie Village, Overland Park, El Dorado, Gem, Bel Aire, Cedarvale, Newton, Shawnee Mission, McPherson, Clearwater, Augusta, Winfield, Kansas City, Haysville and Wichita.

Competition was tough as was mentioned by several of our judges. The judges themselves were tough. They were two journalists, one still with the *Eagle*, the other formerly with the *Eagle*, now with WSU. The others were professors or directors of Creative Writing programs at colleges and universities currently. One was a retired creative writing professor from New Mexico State.

Dr. Richard Spillman, Director of Creative Writing for WSU, chose the Best of the Firsts winner from the first place entries in all the categories, choosing *The Question*, the entry of Julia Kraus who won the Young Writer Prose category first.

We are scheduling the presentation of the 2005 anthology containing all the winners poems, articles and stories for April. There will be readings and signings at Watermark Books and Cafe. Look for the announcement in the near future.
