High Concept Pitching. Many of us as writers have heard the importance of being able to present your novel in a sentence. This is important not only for being able to explain your project at an editor or agent appointment, but also for that casual opportunity for promotion anywhere, anytime. This type of project pitching is not only for novels. You can use the same concept for promoting your script, a poetry chapbook, a non-fiction book, a memoir, articles, etc.

Our members from Keyhole Conversations, Hazel Hart and Bonnie Myrick Eaton, will discuss the key points of High Concept Pitching, will help with a brief workshop, and then shoot a couple of pitches. The video pitches will be posted on the KWA website.

Writers can't be choosers, can they? Sometimes our lives are so busy outside of writing that we can't choose *where* we write, let alone *when*. In the Marines, there's one phrase that's used nearly as much as *semper fidelis!*—especially when times get tough and there seems to be no apparent solution: "Improvise Marine!"

If you're shooting for a traditional publishing contract, a good pitch is actually about as important as your manuscript. After all if you don't write a great query letter, you'll have a hard time finding an agent or editor who will want to read your work.

So, how do you write a good query? Stop by the KWA meeting July 21st and you'll find out. It's all about pitching—and we ain't talking baseball.

Categories

ADULT DIVISION - PROSE

- FIRST CHAPTER Or chapters, up to 3,000 words. If you wish to include a prologue or synopsis, it will count toward the word limit.
- SHORT FICTION Any subject, 2,000 word limit
- SHORT STORIES FOR YOUTH By adults for young adult/youth audience. 2,000 word limit. Fiction or non-fiction.
- NON-FICTION Articles, essays, memoirs, etc. with a 2,000 word limit. Any subject.
- HUMOR—Fiction and non-fiction work will be accepted, 2,000 word limit

ADULT DIVISION - POETRY

- RHYMED POETRY 40-line limit, firm. Single spaced, double between stanzas.
- FREE VERSE 40-line limit, firm. Single spaced, double between stanzas.

YOUTH DIVISION - writers age 18 and under

- PROSE: FICTION/NON-FICTION 2,000 word limit, any subject
- POETRY: RHYMED/FREE VERSE (denote style) 40-line limit. Single spaced, double between stanzas

ENTRY FORMATTING

- Use 12 point Times New Roman font on 8 ½ x 11-inch white paper.
- Double space all prose. Single space poetry stanzas.
- Attach cover page to include contestant's name, address, email and phone number, along with title and category of each entry included.
- Omit name from pages of work to be judged.

RULES

- All entries must be original and unpublished work.
- Five entries (minimum) are needed to qualify for judging any category. This does not mean an individual has to send in five entries, but a total of at least five must be received before the category will be judged and places picked.
- Entrants' work will be judged on literary merit and judges' decisions will be final. All places may not be awarded.
- Entries will be graded down for poor grammar or disregard for common writing practices (unless it's part of the writing theme). Enlist others to help in proofreading your work. Disregard for any of the rules will not be condoned.
- The entry and judge's critique sheet will be returned if a proper sized, self-addressed envelope with adequate postage is included with the entry. If only the critique is desired, please enclose a self-addressed, stamped #10 envelope with entry.
- The decision of the judges is final. No entrant will be awarded more than one of the money prize spots for any one category. Writers are eligible to win one of the top spots in multiple categories.
- No obscene or X-rated material will be judged. If you aren't sure about the suitability of your work, don't send it in.

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Highlights from June's Program: Dailog—Internalization-Narration

Some Important Definitions

**NOTE: "dialog" is the American spelling and "dialogue" is the UK spelling.

Narration: The story teller communicates the story; "tells." **Exposition:** The author relays needed background information, description, explanation, interpretation, and introduces characters. This is done by *static exposition*, "telling" the situation, characters and setting. Or it can be done by *real time depiction* of story action, "showing."

Dialog: A conversation between two or more people or characters; the "shows."

Internal Dialog: (internalization) A character speaks his/her thoughts to himself/herself; internal monologue.

Direct Internalization: A character's given directly, word for word, in present tense and first person

Introspection: Conveying the character's own thoughts, feelings, and sensations, internal inspection.

DIALOG

Must accomplish one of three things:

- 1. Move the story forward
- 2. Give information
- 3. Help with characterization

Characterization Help: Giving each character his/her own voice or speaking style. Differences vary on gender, age, personality, social status, education, geographical location, historical era, etc.

- Professionals may use more correct English and longer sentences. Others may use rougher language, a lot of one- or two-word questions or answers, sprinkled with expletives.
- Personality differences can include: Shy or outgoing?
 Talkative or quiet? Formal or casual? Modern or old-fashioned? Confident or nervous? Tactful or blunt? Serious or lighthearted? Relaxed or stressed?
- Gender differences can include: men are terser and more direct; prefer to talk about things rather than people or feelings; and they often use brief or one-word answers. Women talk about people and relationships; hint at or talk around a subject; tend to express themselves in more complete sentences; and often want to discuss their feelings.

Can also:

- Foreshadow upcoming events
- Make events more vivid
- Give life to characters and their relationships with oth-

ers

Speed up action – short, snappy, abrupt dialogue shows tension

Important Shoulds:

- Should read like real speech, but leave out the boring parts, the filler words, and unessential dialogue that doesn't contribute to the plot in some way
- Should include emotional or sexual tension and subtext. Silence, interrupting, or abruptly changing the subject can be effective in dialog

INTERNALIZATION

Purposes of Internalization:

- Get the reader to identify and empathize with the POV character
- Reveal emotional depth
- Help to establish internal conflicts
- Gives the POV character's slant on the setting, other characters, the situation, conflict, and emotional ties

MECHANICS OF WRITING INTERNALIZATION

- Never use quotation marks around a character's thoughts.
- Use italicized text ONLY for direct internal thoughts spelled out word for word, written in first person, present tense. Do NOT tag internalized thoughts.

NARRATION

Purposes of Narration:

- Show action
- Provide important backstory
- Give clues of the character's growth
- Give details of something about the characters, scene, or plot that can't come out in dialogue
- Let the reader imagine what the POV character sees and experiences in a situation or setting
- Give the reader a breather from the fast pace

NARRATIVE DON'Ts

- Don't write too much narrative that doesn't add to the storyline.
- Don't describe something in detail that could be more simply stated in dialogue.
- In memoirs, don't bog down the narrative summary by telling too much, showing too little.
